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## ***School Recycling is Back!***

School is back in session, which means this is the perfect opportunity for youth across Baltimore to get reacquainted with the 3Rs: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle! Maryland requires all schools and facilities to recycle. The Department of Public Works collects recycling from over 200 public and private schools in Baltimore City. While we have seen a steady increase in the number of schools that are actively participating in our recycling program, there is still room for improvement. Here are a few ways to jump start recycling in our schools.

### Paper & Cardboard:

Paper is the main form of waste created by schools. Encourage schools to start a simple recycling program that will target only paper items. "Paper only" recycling containers can be made in class. Simply find a few old boxes and have the students **REUSE** and repurpose them for the collection of paper. Students can create posters and bright labels to indicate the newly repurposed bins. Cardboard is another simple item for schools to recycle. Just break the boxes down and stack them for easy collection.

### Recycling Presentations:

Appoint a recycling coordinator that will brief teachers, parents and custodians about the importance of recycling. Make recycling a topic at the next PTA meeting, Back to School night or faculty meeting. If adults are active recyclers, then this environmentally-friendly habit should filter down to the students. As an extension of our commitment to Baltimore City Public Schools, DPW will provide recycling presentations for schools. ### Green Teams:

Create a Green Team! A Green Team is an excellent way to get students involved in recycling. A Green Team can be a group of students that work with the school recycling coordinator, custodial staff, or parent volunteer to collect recycling from classrooms and prepare the items for collection. A Green Team is also a good way for students of all ages to earn community service hours.

## **Please don't use plastic bags!**

You can use anything as a container for your recyclables **except** plastic bags. Many grocery stores and supermarkets will recycle plastic bags.



## **Acceptable and Unacceptable Recycling Materials**

### **Acceptable Recycling Material:**

Aerosol Cans (empty)  
Aluminum: cans, beverage and food containers, foil (clean), and pie pans  
Bottles: narrow-neck bottles  
Cartons (waxed): used for a liquid such as juices, milk or soups  
Glass containers such as bottles and jars (brown, clear or green)  
Metal: beverage and food containers  
Plastic: bottles and jars  
Prescription bottles, including caps  
Steel: beverage containers and food  
Tin: cans and foil

### **Rigid Plastics**

#### **(to be taken to the citizen drop-off centers)**

Rigid plastics include milk/soda crates, buckets, laundry baskets, children's toys, etc.

### **Unacceptable Recycling Material Examples:**

Cookware and plates (plastic)  
Containers of toxic substances -e.g., cans motor oil, pesticides, etc.  
Contaminated paper products -e.g., napkins, paper towels, and tissue  
Dry cleaning bags  
Glass (window and mirror)  
Waxed paper
